How can we make our writing more interesting?

Tone

The author's / narrator's / speaker's attitude toward a character, setting (time and place), or event (what happens).

Look for word choice

What does the author think about the man in the next paragraph?

• Think: word choice

The man glared over his cup of coffee. His severe eyebrows knit together as he suspiciously regarded each new customer. The waitress ambivalently approached the man to offer him a refill. At her approach, he anxiously seized his satchel and grumbled a yes. He appeared incensed* at her audacity to disturb his thoughts.

^{*}incensed (adj.): very angry, enraged

• Think: word choice

The man glanced up from his cup of coffee, and his face lit with admiration as the small child entered the café. Her orange balloon bobbing behind her like a friend made him think wistfully about his own childhood. Bemused by the scene, he chuckled once to himself before leaving a generous tip for the waitress.
